### Hon. Judge Robin Ransom 22nd Circuit Court, City of St. Louis Family Court Division

Hon. Judge Robin Ransom has served in the 22nd Judicial Circuit in the City of St. Louis since 2008, currently in the Family Court Division. Beginning January 1, 2019, she will be the presiding judge of the 22nd Circuit, the first African American female judge to serve in this position.

Judge Ransom grew up in the Fairground Park neighborhood of north St. Louis. She obtained her undergraduate degree from Douglas College-Rutgers University in 1988 and graduated from the University of Missouri-Columbia School of Law in 1991. She began her career as an assistant public defender for the St. Louis County Circuit Court and then an assistant prosecuting attorney. She joined the legal department of the St. Louis County Family Court—Juvenile Division in 1996 until she was appointed as a Family Court Commissioner for the 22nd Judicial Circuit in 2002. She continued in this role until her 2008 appointment as judge by Gov. Matt Blunt.

The parent of two adopted children, Judge Ransom has joined in community efforts to promote adoption.

### Cynthia D. Williams, MSW Washington University Brown School

As the oldest of five children in a family that was among the first to racially integrate University City, Cynthia D. Williams has made it her personal mission to empower those who feel marginalized or powerless to find their voice.

Since graduating with her master's degree from Washington University in St. Louis, George Warren Brown School of Social Work, Cynthia has served as an integral member of the school for over 39 years. Currently assistant dean for community partnerships, she is well known for her patience, intelligence, and ability to find solutions that unify people while respecting individual and community voices.

Cynthia also served for approximately 15 years as a foster parent to children whose behavioral issues impeded adoption. She has taken an active role in developing coursework and providing training to assist birth and foster families during the reunification and adoption process, and to support other foster families in navigating the challenges of caring for displaced and high-risk children.



into care. Because she establishes cooperative relationships with home finders and licensing staff at other agencies, they often share resources. Her memory is AMAZING. She can recall specific strengths of particular homes to assure a good fit for children. When timeliness requires going the extra mile to run background checks and do home walk-throughs to license relatives, it is no problem. Meaghan is invaluable to our agency, and shows calm and grace in what is often a thankless job. All with a smile on her face!



### Mockia “Nikki” Shelton

### Jennifer Thomas

Jennifer is exceptional because she always steps in when needed. One of the most selfless people imaginable, she supports her workers when they are overwhelmed, even when she has a lot on her own plate professionally and personally. 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# HONOREES: PARENTS AND FAMILIES

## Maria Holmes

Resource Family

*“Kids always come first for Maria.”*

Maria is a treatment foster parent and played a key role in developing the program at Good Shepherd. She mentors new resource families to ensure successful, strength-based parenting. She does an amazing job working with biological families in an inclusive and positive manner. Maria often goes way beyond the expected by arranging more frequent sibling visits than is required. She is sensitive to the needs of biological

family members and recently helped a grandmother balance visits when the grandmother’s health was declining. And of course, she cares deeply for the children in her care. Children in her home experience a safe and nurturing environment where true healing takes place. When Maria recently lost her home due to a fire, her first concern was maintaining safety and security for the children in her care. Kids always come first for Maria.



## Wanda Noel

Resource Family  
Nominated by Cassie Holt and Lorna Thomlinson

*“There is nothing Wanda would not do for someone in need, especially children she fostered.”*

For Wanda Noel, there is no limit on caring. Children placed with her are treated as her own children. And when they leave her home, she continues to be there for them when they need assistance. A touching example is a pregnant teen who placed with Wanda a year before becoming pregnant. The homeless teen turned to Wanda, who connected her to a program (more than an hour’s drive from Wanda’s home) that provided a

place to live, assistance in finishing high school and finding a job. When young people “age out” of foster care, Wanda continues to provide support. She is creative in helping youth find jobs when they are in her home, as well as when they transition to greater independence. She sets up a bank account for older children who have a job and matches the deposits they make. Holidays routinely find a mix of children’s biological relatives in Wanda’s home. Wanda not only recruits resource families at her church, but also shares resources with case managers.



## Shirley and Jimmie Walker

Resource Family  
Nominated by Ruthanne Willeke

*“I praise my kids when they do well. I also hug my kids and tell them I love them, and that I care about what happens to them.” – Shirley Walker*

The children placed with Jimmie and Shirley are not just placed in a house. They are in a loving extended family – a home where love reigns, even when days are difficult. One example is the three siblings they recently fostered for more than eight years. These were sometimes challenging years, and the Walkers spent countless hours at school solving problematic behaviors and sought guidance from a therapist. They were active advocates for the children in their care: participat-

ing in family support teams, being present at court hearings, and willingly sharing their experiences with other resource families in trauma training. Jimmie and Shirley actively supported the children’s biological mom by supporting her, encouraging phone calls with the children, and inviting her to share holidays in their home. The Walkers encouraged the children to participate in Girl Scouts, the Good News Club, sports and other community events. The children have transitioned to another home, but continue to visit the Walkers weekly and continue to receive their warm love and support.
